Apply for Trips and Key Award!

For Barron County 4-H Members in Grades 5-13

You are invited to apply for a variety of 4-H Trips and the Key Award. The experiences you are eligible for is dependent upon your grade/age. These are opportunities available only to older members of the Barron County 4-H program. Please see the information on pages 6-7 about each experience.

To be considered, you must:

1. Complete and submit the Member Evaluation (ME) Form
2. Complete and submit the Trip Preference Form
3. Submit two letters of recommendation: one from your 4-H Club Leader and one from another person of your choosing. The letters should be from people who aren't related to you; if your 4-H Club Leader is related to you, ask another adult leader in your club.
4. Participate in a 15-minute interview

Your completed ME Form, Trip Preference Form, and two letters of recommendation must be submitted to the UW-Extension Office by **Friday, November 14**.

Interviews will be scheduled on the early evenings of November 17 and 18. Refer to the ME/Interview Evaluation Form found on the UW-Extension website (address below) for information on how you will be evaluated by interviewers.

By taking part in this process, you will take stock of your 4-H experiences to date, practice valuable interviewing skills in a supportive environment, and have a chance to represent Barron County on a 4-H trip. If you have questions on the interview process, attend the ME Workshop on October 20 (see below), ask your club leader, members in your club who have interviewed before, or contact Mary Pardee at mary.pardee@ces.uwex.edu or 715-537-6253.

Overview

Each year, your family will re-enroll members and leaders in 4HOnline. This is a simple process that will not take much time. A 2015 Project Guide was included in your September newsletter, or you can find it at <http://barron.uwex.edu>. Click on 4-H Youth Development and then Join 4-H.

Please re-enroll soon so you don't miss out on any newsletters, project mailings or other 4-H information!

Getting started

To get started with the re-enrollment process, log into 4HOnline (wi.4HOnline.com) with your family email and password. If you forgot your password, email Mary at mary.pardee@ces.uwex.edu to have your password reset and sent to you.

On the family home screen, click on the orange button labeled Continue to Family.

On your Member/Volunteer list, find the family member you wish to re-enroll and click on Edit next to their name.

Re-enroll

At the bottom of the next screen, click on the button for Enroll for 2014-2015.

You will now see the Personal Information that you entered when you first enrolled. Look over the information and make any corrections. Grade and age will have increased automatically. When you are done, click on Continue.

Next is the Additional Information screen. You need to accept the agreements and answer the Photo Release and Accommodations questions. Click Continue when done.

The Health Form for members is optional at enrollment, but you could be asked to complete it in the future if you attend any events that require one. Click Continue when done.

If you are an adult volunteer and see the Volunteer Screening page, then it has been 4 years since the last time a background check has been completed. You need to check over the answers to the questions and correct as needed. This page will only appear every 4 years. Click Continue when done.

On the Participation -> Club screen, confirm the correct club is listed. If you serve in a volunteer role, click on Edit and select the volunteer type. Click on Update to save the change. Click on Continue when done.

On the Participation -> Projects screen, confirm all the projects you are enrolled in are listed. Add any missing projects. If you are dropping a project, click on Edit for that project and then click on Delete. After making sure all your projects are listed correctly, click on Submit Enrollment.

Pumpkin Painting

GLOVERBUD CORNER

You will need:


- Newspaper or tablecloth
- A pumpkin
- Masking tape
- Copies of pumpkin painting designs (there are some here or you can find your own)
- Acrylic paint
- Pen
- Paintbrushes
- Water pots for cleaning brushes
- Paper towels
- Gloss sealer in a spray can



Instructions:

Cover the work surface with newspaper or tablecloth. Choose a design to paint on your pumpkin. Tape the design to the pumpkin using masking tape, and trace around the design to transfer the lines to the pumpkin skin. You will need to press fairly hard to make an impression on the pumpkin. Remove the paper. If you wish, you can outline the design with a pen, marking directly on the pumpkin. Paint your design and allow it to dry. Spray the whole pumpkin with a gloss sealer. The pumpkin should last for at least a month.

2015 Wisconsin State and National 4-H Trips

The Barron County 4-H Association provides up to \$200 per member per year towards educational 4-H-sponsored events above the county level. The Association also funds national trips at 50% of the cost. The national trips include CWF, Space Camp, National Congress, National Conference and American Spirit. If a member receives funding for one of the national trips, they will also be eligible for the \$200 funding for additional events.

Benefits of traveling through 4-H: Meet new people that become lifelong friends, learn about yourself and others, see new places, gain travel experience, learn skills that you will use and your future employers will appreciate, much of the cost is covered, etc.!! Space Camp

Held in Huntsville, Alabama. April 16-20, 2015. Explore the fascinating world of aerospace, astronomy and technology! 4-H Missions in Space program is a fun-filled weekend at the U.S. Space & Rocket Center where participants will complete a simulated Space Shuttle mission, experience training simulators, tour the U.S. Space & Rocket Center and learn about becoming an astronaut. Delegates participate in hands-on mock space missions and other activities in this NASA program. Qualifications: be in grades 6-8 and maximum age of 15 at time of trip. Cost of Space Camp is approximately \$525 (**Barron 4-H will pay for half**).

Wisconsin 4-H & Youth Conference

Held at the University of Wisconsin in Madison. June 22-25, 2015. Approximately 600 youth travel to Madison each summer for this conference. Participants take part in educational seminars and fun social events while they make new friends from across Wisconsin. They are encouraged to take what they learn and share it with others in their home communities. Qualifications: be in grades 7-10 at time of selection. Conference registration fee is approximately \$235 (**use your 4-H funding to get up to \$200 reimbursed**).

Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF)

Held one week in June or July 2015 in Washington, DC. (You are able to choose from multiple weeks.) CWF is a 4-H leadership program for high school youth from across the country. Participants stay at the National 4-H Conference Center, near Washington, D.C., participating in a week-long program focused toward broadening delegates' appreciation and respect for themselves and others in their world. The week consists of participatory workshops, speakers, committee work, field trips to see the sights of DC and social events. Qualifications: be in grades 10-12 and minimum age 15 at time of trip. Total cost for the trip is approximately \$1,100 (**Barron 4-H will pay for half**).

National 4-H Congress

Held in Atlanta, Georgia. Nov. 27-Dec. 2, 2015. Approximately 1,300 4-H members from around the U.S. and Puerto Rico come together to practice skills in leadership, community service and multi-cultural integration. In addition to attending assemblies and workshops, they participate in discussion groups on issues facing our country today and moderate a town hall meeting at which they share the results of those discussions. Also, delegates participate in hands-on projects during a day of community service as they learn how to work with others to help individuals and organizations in a community improve themselves. Delegates take part in social events including tours of Atlanta and dinner/dances. Qualifications: be in grades 10-12 and maximum age of 18 as of January 1 in year of travel. Trip cost is approximately \$1,100 (**WI 4-H Foundation will contribute, and 4-H will pay for half of the remainder**).

National 4-H Conference

Held in Washington, D.C. April 10-16, 2015. Six (6) youth from Wisconsin 4-H are selected to attend this working conference held at the National 4-H Center. Barron County can nominate one youth for consideration by the State 4-H selection committee. Each participant selects an issue and works with other youth from across the country to develop plans that help direct future 4-H programming. One day is spent on Capitol Hill meeting with legislators and touring. Qualifications: be in grades 10-12 and maximum age of 18 as of January 1 in year of travel. Trip cost is approximately \$1,100 (**WI 4-H Foundation will contribute, and 4-H will pay for half of the remainder**).

2015 Barron County 4-H Trips and Key Award

4-H American Spirit Experience

Travel to Eastern states, June 10-18, 2015. Youth from UW-Extension's Northwest Region will increase their knowledge and understanding of America's heritage. Participants will visit an Amish Village, Valley Forge, Philadelphia, New York, Plymouth Rock, and Boston. They will see the Atlantic Ocean and go whale watching. Youth awarded this trip will be expected to attend preliminary meetings and take an active role in planning. Qualifications: be in grades 8-10. Cost is approximately \$1200 (**Barron 4-H will pay for half**).

Exchange Trip

Barron County and Ashland County, Ohio, will work together to design a two-year exchange experience. Barron youth will travel in late June/early July of 2015 and stay in the homes of 4-H families in Ohio. Delegates will then host Ohio youth in the summer of 2016. Qualifications: be in grades 8-12, be able to host in 2016. Cost is to be determined, likely \$400-\$500 (**use your 4-H funding to get up to \$200 reimbursed**).

Discover Wisconsin

4-H members in grades 5-7 will design and plan a trip to "somewhere in Wisconsin" together, with guidance from adult leaders. Because of the nature of this trip, there will be several required meetings in advance of the trip to prepare the itinerary. The number of youth awarded this experience will be limited. Trip dates are TBA; expected cost should be less than \$100, depending upon the plans made by the group (**use your 4-H funding to get up to \$200 reimbursed**).

Canada Fishing Trip

Eight 4-H youth will travel to Lake Pakashkan in Ontario. Participants stay in a cabin, fish for Walleye and Northern, take active roles in making meals and keeping camp, and socialize with other delegates. Don Drost and Don Peterson, experienced fishermen and co-owners of the property, will serve as chaperones and hosts of this trip. Trip dates are to be determined, but will be late July or August of 2015. Qualifications: be in grades 8-13, have or obtain a passport or passport card. Cost: About \$150 (**use your 4-H funding to get up to \$200 reimbursed**).

Key Award

The Key Award is the most prestigious award that a 4-H member can receive. The award is based on member's total 4-H record, projects, leadership, and activity involvement. Members who will be graduating from 4-H in 2015, and who are grades 12 or 13 may be selected; winners are announced at the 4-H Graduation program. This award is sponsored by Farm Bureau and Rural Insurance Company.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I apply for these trips?

Fill out a Barron County 4-H Member Evaluation (ME) Form and the Trips/Award Preference Form and return them to the UW-Extension office by the due date of November 14. You must include two letters of recommendation – one from your club leader and one from another person of your choice. The recommendation letters should not be from relatives. If your club leader is a relative, please ask another adult leader within your club. The next step in the process is an interview. Interviews will be held in early January. You will be notified of your date and time.

Can I apply for more than one trip?

Yes! You can apply for as many opportunities as you want by marking them on the Trips/Award Preference Form. You may be asked to rank their importance in your interview.

Is this going to cost a lot?

The Trips Committee will offer fundraising opportunities for youth going on State and National trips and on county trips. In addition, the Barron County 4-H Association offers assistance. Depending upon the trip, taking part in fundraising may cover the cost. All costs not covered by fundraising or the 4-H Association must be paid by the delegate.

Do I need to interview if I am applying for the Key Award?

Yes, the Key Award is available only through this Member Evaluation process, which includes the ME Form and interview.

★ Did you Know? ★

4-H Projects

- A 4-H project is a topic that you may want to learn more about during the 4-H year. 4-H members must pick at least one project, and many sign up for as many projects as they want each year. You'll have many projects to consider, from art to woodworking, from trees to rabbits, from clothing to computers. For lists and descriptions, see the publication titled "Barron County 4-H Project Guide" which was included in the September newsletter or you can find it online at the UW-Extension website on the "Join 4-H" page.
- Youth in grades K5 to 2 will enroll in Cloverbuds and/ or Exploring. These are the only options provided by 4HOnline for kids of these grade levels.
- To exhibit animals at the fair, youth must be in at least 3rd grade. This means that youth must be 3rd grade or older to enroll in any 4-H animal project. This Wisconsin 4-H policy is for the safety of the 4-H member. The ability and maturity level of the youth, as well as the unpredictable behavior of animals, should be considered by parents prior to involving youth in an animal project.

Opportunity: Cloverbud Committee Member

Who: Adult Leaders and teens

Task Description: Form a committee to look at what 4-H offers Cloverbuds, with the intent of attracting and keeping Cloverbuds in 4-H long-term. Design and carry out special opportunities for Cloverbud-age members in 2014-2015. Re-design Cloverbud book.
Time Commitment: Several meetings over the course of the next year. Committee will set own agenda and course.

Opportunity: 4-H Project Discovery Day Co-Chair

Who: Adult Leader

Description: Along with current chairperson and UW-Extension, find presenters and arrange for classes, provide information for 4-H newsletter, and attend Project Discovery Days to register youth and provide assistance to presenters. 4-H Project Discovery Days are held on the 2nd Saturday of the month over the winter months.
Time Commitment: Approximately 6 hours a month from November through April.

Opportunity: 4-H Project Discovery Day Presenter

Who: Adult Leaders and teens

Description: Teach a hands-on three-hour class at a Project Discovery Day, held the 2nd Saturday of the month over the winter months. Any 4-H project area can be taught. If you teach something within your 4-H Club, why not offer it county-wide?
Time Commitment: 3 hour class plus prep time

Opportunity: 4-H Awards Program Helper

Who: Adults and youth (Adults do not have to be enrolled leaders for this volunteer opportunity.)

Description: Set up, clean up, serve food, etc. About 4 people needed.

Time Commitment: One day (Oct. 18), 11:30 a.m. to about 2:30 p.m.

Opportunity: Interviewer

Who: Adult Leaders

Description: Review ME forms and interview older members as they apply for trips and the key award. Fill out evaluation sheet and provide feedback. This is a great way to interact with older members and learn about all the amazing things 4-H youth are involved in.

Time Commitment: Interviews will take place on November 17 and 18 between 4 and 7 p.m.

New Volunteer Orientation Sessions

Do you want to become a 4-H Adult Volunteer? Adults who regularly work with youth at the club level or county level should enroll in 4-H and participate in the 4-H youth protection process. Committee members who vote on decisions that affect 4-H programming are required to be trained volunteers. To become an adult volunteer, attend a one-time training where you will enroll using 4HOnline, learn about 4-H programming and how to protect youth. The youth protection process includes a background check on all new volunteers, which is then repeated every four years. As a volunteer, you will re-enroll each year and adhere to the volunteer behavior agreement set forth by the State 4-H program.
