Barron- Polk County Talent Expo 2023



Registration for the 2023 Talent Expo Opens January 13

Do you have a special talent you would like to share? Join us on April 15 in Turtle Lake for the 2023 Talent Expo. Entries include instrumental, piano, or vocal performances, demonstration speeches, interpretive reading, original speech, plays, group musical performances, and NEW this year, digital media entry! Gather your friends, club members, or go for a solo and create something great to showcase your talents.

Registration will be completed through 4-H Online (under events), but paper forms are available by request. All large group performances will need to fill out a paper form. See full event descriptions and large group registration forms in this month's newsletter. All registrations are due by March 15th

Speaking/Interpretive Reading Entry

Open to youth grades K and up, except 4-H Pledge (K-4) and FFA Creed (6-9) Original Speech - Open to all youth. Talks should be developed by the member who is presenting it. No posters or props may be used. The youth may speak about any topic of interest. TIMES: Grades K-2: 1-2 minutes; Grades 3-5: 2-3 minutes; Grades 6-8: 3-4 minutes; Grades 9-13: 4-6 minutes.

<u>4-H Pledge</u> - For youth Cloverbud up to Grade 4. Cloverbuds will not receive a fair premium. Pledge must be memorized. Youth will be judged on voice, stage presence, expression, general effect, and correctness.

<u>FFA Creed</u> – For youth in Grades 6-9. Creed must be memorized. Youth will be judged on voice, stage presence, expression, general effect, and correctness.

<u>Interpretive Reading</u> - Open to all youth, individual or group. Selections may be prose or poetry, original or selected reading. If not an original, the author must be credited. Include a short introduction to your reading. Reading should NOT be memorized. Use full-sized copies of selections (not note cards). No podium will be provided. TIMES (Individual or Team): Grades K-2: 1-2 minutes; Grades 3-5: 2-3 minutes; Grades 6-8: 3-4 minutes; Grades 9-13: 4-6 minutes. *For groups, age is determined by oldest member

Demonstration Entry

Open to youth grades Kindergarten and up, Individual or Team, one 8-foot table is provided. <u>Formal Demonstration</u> — Showing and telling an audience how to make or do something. Presents information through actions with an explanation. Has an introduction, body and conclusion followed by a time to answer questions. Select a topic of interest to you. Props and visual aids are encouraged TIMES: Grades K-2: 2-4 minute demonstration: Grades 3-5: 4-7 minute demonstration; Grades 6-8: 5-8 minute demonstration; Grades 9-13: 8-10 minute demonstration.

<u>Action Demonstration</u> – Sharing ideas or showing how to do a skill in an informal way. The audience may participate and ask questions throughout the demonstration. The demonstrator(s) converses with audience members who are standing around the table/area. The audience participates by talking with the demonstrator, trying things, doing, tasting, asking questions, etc. Handouts, posters, pictures can be used. Select a topic of interest to you. Youth must interact and have enough supplies for the audience to take part in the demonstration. TIMES: Action demonstrations for all age groups should be up to 15 minutes.

Musical Performance Entry -Vocal, Dance, Instrumental

open to youth grades Kindergarten-13, solo or groups of 4 or less) 4-H members may enter in more than one category. Each participant should bring a copy of their music for the judge.

A piano is <u>not</u> available in the instrumental room.

<u>Vocal</u>- Performances should emphasize vocal qualities and delivery. **TIMES:** No longer than 5 minutes.

<u>Dance-Performances</u> should be original and show interpretation of the musical selection.

<u>Instrumental</u>-Includes all instruments other than Piano. Please note: a piano is NOT available in the instrumental room for accompaniment.

<u>Piano</u>-Performance should show proper interpretation of the musical selection through the use of dynamics, expression, and precision.

Group Musical Performance

Performances may include vocals, instrumentals, and/or dance. Pantomiming or lip synching to recordings is not permitted.

- Performances must include five or more performers.
- All props will be the responsibility of the performers/directors.
- All performers and directors must be currently enrolled as Barron, Pierce, Polk, or St. Croix County 4-H members/volunteers.
- No hay bales, straw bales, candles, real fires, liquids, or weapons of any kind (real or fake) will be used in performances.
- Performances should be no longer than 15 minutes in length, including set-up and take-down.
- Accompanists or directors will not be allowed to sing along with their group's presentation.
- Groups should give a brief introduction to the musical performance to set the stage.

Barron- Polk County Talent Expo 2023 Continued

Drama Entry

- All props will be the responsibility of the performers/directors.
- All actors and directors must be currently enrolled Barron, Pierce, Polk, or St. Croix County 4-H members/volunteers.
- No hay bales, straw bales, candles, real fires, liquids, or weapons of any kind (real or fake) will be used in performances.
- Performances must include two or more actors.

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<u>On Stage Drama</u>—Performance length can be up to 30 minutes, including set-up and take-down time.

<u>Mini-Drama or Skit</u>—Mini-dramas and skits can be performed at or in any place (setting) without a stage and might include puppetry, creative dramatics, etc.

Mini-dramas may use props and costumes. Skits use minimal or no props and costumes. Performance length can be up to 15 minutes, including set-up and take-down time.

Digital Media Entry -New in 2023!

Open to youth grades 3 and up, Individual or Team

<u>Digital Video Creation</u> – A creative or informational work on any topic in digital video format. Can include action, still images, music, voice, etc. Be prepared to answer questions about your editing and planning. TIMES: Grades 3-5: 2-4 minute video; Grades 6-8: 3-5 minute video; Grades 9-13: 4-7 minute video.

EXPECTATIONS AND RANGE PROCEDURES

- Remember that we are guests at the training center. Please make sure:
 - o The floor of the center is swept and restrooms and entry way are left clean.
 - o Chairs, tables, and brooms are returned to their original location
 - o **Do not throw targets away at the church** take them home with you!
 - o You express your appreciation for the use of the facility
- Sign in upon arrival at the training center and help set-up.
- Bows brought to the training center must be cased and remain cased until the range has been "set up" for shooting. Bow cases should be kept out of the way of doors, bathrooms, etc.
- Everyone help clean-up.

Follow additional COVID-19 regulations and guidelines.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- Any time anyone calls **CEASE FIRE**, shooting must absolutely **STOP** immediately because something has become unsafe. Any time anyone sees something that may be unsafe that person must call **CEASE FIRE**!
- Arrows must always point down range when nocking and drawing.
- Never cross in front of the firing line for any reason until you hear the commands: "The line is closed you may inspect your targets." Never attempt to retrieve an arrow or equipment dropped in front of the line.
- Goofing off will not be tolerated. First offense will get you one reminder; a repeat offence will result in loss of the privilege of shooting for the remainder of that session. A parent or guardian will need to accompany you to the next session.

BOW DRAW-WEIGHT LIMITATIONS

- The backstop material has a limited capacity to stop arrows shot from higher poundage bows. In order to limit damage to the facility, no bow will exceed a draw-weight of 50 lbs.
- Bows with a draw-weight so great that the shooter must struggle with the draw or hold pose a danger to the shooter and to others and will be adjusted

USED EQUIPMENT

An area will be provided to display any archery equipment which you may want to sell or trade. Attach a note to an item offered indicating specifics, poundage, price, and contact information.

AGE GROUPS, SHOOTING DISTANCE, SHOOTING CATEGORIES

Participants must be enrolled in regular 4-H (3rd grade and older). The participant may select one of three shooting categories (may only compete in one category)

- Ages 15-19: **Senior** 20 yards
- Ages 12-14: **Intermediate** 15 vards
- Ages 10,11: **Juniors** 10 yards
- Ages 8,9: Beginners 10 yards
- Barebow: No sights, mechanical release, or stabilizers.
- Limited Freestyle: A mechanical release *OR* non-optical sights and stabilizers may be used.
- **Unlimited Freestyle**: Any type of sights, mechanical releases, and stabilizers may be used.

RANGE COMMANDS

COMMAND: "SHOOTERS TO THE LINE"

Shooters will bring bows and arrows to the shooting line, positioning themselves in front of the target they have hung. If there is a high and low target hung, shooters shooting at high targets will be asked to approach the line first. **DO NOT NOCK AN ARROW UNTIL DIRECTED TO DO SO!**

QUESTION: "IS THE FIRING LINE READY?"

If you have a problem say NO! or NOT READY! and raise your hand. Your instructor will be watching from either in front of or behind the shooting line and will respond.

- 1st Repeat of Question: "The Line is Ready?" If you have a problem say NO! or NOT READY! And raise your hand.
- 2nd Repeat of Question: "Ready on the right?"
- 3rd Repeat of Question: "Ready on the left?"

If there is not a NO! or NOT READY! response and if your instructor sees no problem, your instructor will confirm the line is ready.

CONFIRMATION: "READY ON THE FIRING LINE."

(REMEMBER, DO NOT NOCK AN ARROW UNTIL DIRECTED TO DO SO!)

COMMAND: "NOCK AN ARROW AND COMMENCE FIRING"

You may now nock, draw, and shoot your first arrow. You will then continue to shoot the remaining 4 arrows at your own command to complete the end of five arrows. When you have completed an end with the shooting of **five arrows**, retreat back from the firing line to allow others to begin shooting or to wait for others to finish.

QUESTION: "IS ANY MORE TIME NEEDED?" If yes, say YES!

COMMAND: "CEASE FIRE - THE LINE IS CLOSED."

COMMAND: "YOU MAY INSPECT YOUR TARGET AND RETRIEVE YOUR ARROWS."

WALK to within 3 steps of the targets and stop. If some targets are hung high and some targets are hung low, the shooters with the high-hung targets will pull their arrows first and return to the firing line. The shooters of the low-hung targets will then advance and pull their arrows. **Don't get poked in the eye by an arrow!**

Reminder: Any time anyone calls "CEASE FIRE," shooting must absolutely STOP immediately because something has become unsafe. Any time anyone sees something that may be unsafe that person must call CEASE FIRE!

CHECKLIST FOR PARTICIPANTS

	ng your own equipment, inspect it for damage If you have any questions or concerns about your own equipment, speak to an instructor before shooting. Damaged equipment will not be allowed.

□ Paren •	t or guardian We ask the parents or guardians accompany first year shooters. Parents or guardians may stay with shooters during training sessions, but may be asked to stand back if they are interfering with the learning and practice of their youth or others.
•	If you have questions about your equipment, please ask an instructor. Shooters may use compound or recurve bows. Most will use compound. Cross bows may not be used at indoor training centers or the indoor or outdoor fair shoots. A separate outdoor cross bow event will be held for interested participants. Each shooter should have 5-6 arrows fitted with target or field tips only. Damaged or unsafe equipment will not be allowed. Inspect your equipment. Participants are not required to have their own equipment. If you do not have your own equipment ask an instructor to help fit you with a county bow.

Students use a buzzer to answer the questions by giving oral answers to questions posed by a moderator. Similar to the game show Jeopardy. Each match has both an individual and toss-up question round. Teams compete in a double elimination format. The top team earns the opportunity to compete at the national competition.

Livestock Skill-a-thon: Everything you know about raising your animal adds up to so much knowledge of the species and the industry. The Skill-a-thon contest will help you challenge you to share that information through a written quiz and learning stations such as breed identification, feed identification, equipment identification as well as some team activities such as demonstrating evaluation skills. There are both individual and team stations. The top team earns the opportunity to compete at the national competition.

Who can participate? Any current 4-H members grades 3-13. Please note, there are age divisions for each of those contests and parameters for grade 13 members. Please see the contest information in the link below for more information on the age divisions. Even if your county has not participated in the past, round-up some 4-H friends and take advantage of this fun opportunity to show your knowledge of the animal species and industry.

What is the 4-H Meats Judging Contest? Have you been to your local meat market or grocery store lately and think you could choose the best cut of meat out of the case? Have you ever watched a live animal contest and thought you could

choose what animals would provide the best meat products? This is your opportunity to put those skills to work. This contest tests the knowledge of youth in the placement of carcass and retail cut classes, carcass grading, and retail cut identification. Top teams earn the opportunity to compete at regional and national competitions.

Who can participate? You must be a currently enrolled WI 4-H member to participate in this contest. The age divisions are: Junior – Age 8-13 as of January 1, 2023; Senior – Age 14-18 as of January 1, 2023. WI 4-H members that are in the 13th grade and have reached their 19th birthday prior to January 1, 2023 are eligible to compete at this state contest as individuals but not as a member of a team. Youth must be in or completed 3rd grade, 8-year-old Cloverbuds cannot participate.

Dairy Quiz Bowl is for anyone in 4-H that has an interest in agriculture, dairy, animals, science, nutrition, health, history, learning fun facts, having fun, competition, and the possibility of going to the state competition which will be held February 25th, 2023, at the UW Green Bay. (You do

not have to go to the state competition to join in the practices and fun on the Barron County level.

We will have to have teams finalized prior to the state registration deadline of Feb. 12th, Per state rules, team member's ages are ages as of January 1st of 2023 (grades 3-13)

We would like to offer this in Barron County to the youth Ages 4 - through grade 2 that are interested. (A parent or adult will be asked to stay at practices with them.) Besides learning all the fun facts, we will learn to work together as a team, be a leader, learn to follow -for the team, become confident, speak clearly, listen well, think strategy, buzz in fast, follow rules, play fair and be respectful ...to name a few!


