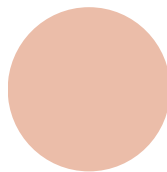
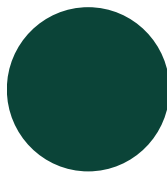
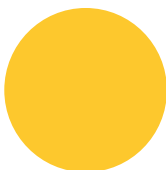
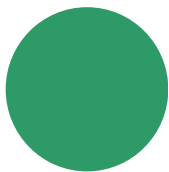
Take a dip in the **Ladysmith Flowage** at **Memorial Park** in downtown Ladysmith or **Josie Creek County Park** in Tony. Rusk County is home to more than **250 lakes** and flowages. Lake Flambeau (also known as the **Dairyland Flowage**) is a 1,900-acre body of water just east of Ladysmith. With **five public access points**, it is a popular destination for fishing and boating.

Fishing Hall of Fame

Sawyer County is a special place in Northern Wisconsin. It provides many attractions and natural wonders, such as the **Fishing Hall of Fame** in Hayward, and holds the World Record Muskie honor.



National Forest Exploring

The Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest contains over **2,000 miles of streams** (nearly 1,400 miles are classified as trout water), **607** lakes greater than ten acres in size, over **400** spring ponds, and **324,000 acres** of wetland.



ATV Trails

Whether you like a leisurely ride or to crank up the throttle, Sawyer County has an ATV trail for you. Take it easy along the **Tuscobia Trail** or tear it up along the 56 miles of **Dead Horse Trail** and take in all the beauty of Sawyer County.



Many Attractions

Sawyer County does not lack in the attractions department. Along with the Fishing Hall of Fame, Sawyer County is home to **Wilderness Walk, Cable History Museum, Winter Greenhouse, and more.**

Washburn County

A Moment in Time

Wondering what it was like back in the 19th century? Washburn County can show you. **Trego** is home to museums dedicated to protecting railway memorabilia; **Spooner** has an entire museum honoring canoe building; **Birchwood** has a Log Museum; and **Shell Lake** is home to the Washburn County Historical Museum. Make sure to visit one of these keepers of the past.



Hunt Hill

Hunt Hill Audubon Sanctuary is a **600-acre** sanctuary with **7 miles** of hiking trails for all levels of hiker. Various habitats can be found on site. There is a Discovery Trail that features hidden gems, changed monthly.

Water Fun

With over **1,000 lakes** and a **big stretch of the Namekagan River** in Washburn County, there is plenty of opportunity to soak up some sun and swim. Build a sand castle at **Shell Lake Beach**, or rent* some tubes and float down the Namekogan. If indoor water is what you seek, visit **Jack Link's Aquatic Center*** or **Best Western*** for an open swim! *Some activities may have costs attached to them.

Thumb Print Family Tree



Every person wants to feel connected and belong. Families are where the first sense of belonging is. Spend some time with your child looking through the pictures and telling stories. The time spent together focusing on family will help children learn about their heritage. Every family is unique and special and it is important for children to learn about family members and how they are connected, regardless where they live.

You can create a thumb print family tree with your child to help them remember their own family tree.

Family trees are a fun way to learn about our family members. They are also a great multigenerational activity for families to do together.

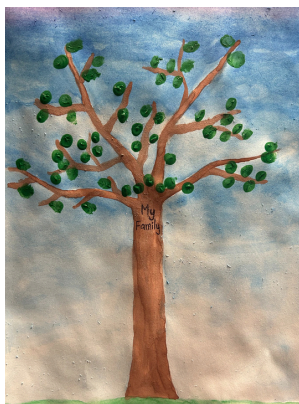
Tip – To save time during the activity, cut the cardstock into rectangles ahead of time. You will also need a list of family members on both sides of the family.

Materials:

- **White cardstock paper**
 - (cut into 8" x 10" rectangles)
- **washable brown and green paint**
- **Styrofoam plates**
- **paper towels**
- **paint brushes**
- **black or brown permanent markers**
- **one 8" x 10" frame per child** (optional)
- **wet wipes**

What to do:

Paint a blank tree (including the stump and multiple branches) big enough to cover your page from top to bottom. **Allow to dry.**

Squeeze green paint onto the Styrofoam plates.

Show your child how to dip their thumbs into the paint and gently onto a paper towel to remove excess.

Then, have them press their wet thumbs onto the branches of the tree to create leaves for each family member on both sides of the family. They can use different colors of green to create depth.

Place the thumb prints accordingly, so that families are represented in clusters.

Once the paint is dry, write family names on the leaves.

Optional:

Frame the artwork and hang it in a common area for the family to enjoy.

4-H Friendship Bracelet



Materials Needed:

- Hemp cord
- 1 white bead
- 1 clear bead
- 1 red bead
- 1 yellow bead
- 1 dark blue bead
- 1 green bead
- 1 purple bead
- 1 light/sky blue bead

4-H Promotes Learning by Doing: Measure a hemp cord at least 14 inches long and tie a knot at 5 inches. This cord and knot represent all that you “Learn by Doing” in the 4-H program.

4-H Emblem: The symbol of 4-H is a green four-leaf clover with 4 white Hs, one on each leaf. Slip a white bead on the cord until it reaches the first knot. This bead represents the 4 Hs on the 4-H clover. The white stands for purity and wholesomeness. Head – Heart – Hands – Health represent the whole self.

4-H Pledge: I pledge....

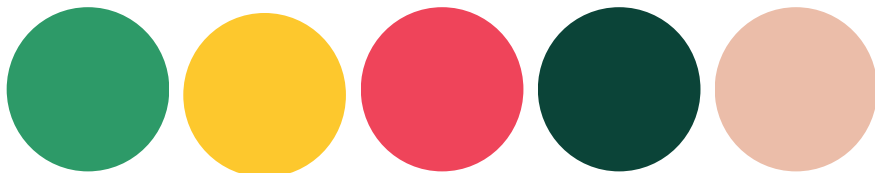
- **My Head to clearer thinking:** Slip a clear bead on to represent the first H – Head. This stands for clearer thinking.
- **My Heart to greater loyalty:** Slip a red bead on next to represent the second H –Heart. This is symbolic of loyalty.
- **My Hands to larger service:** Slip a yellow bead on next to represent the third H – Hands. Yellow is the color of sunshine and warmth. When you serve others, it is you shining through.
- **And My Health to better living:** Slip a dark blue bead on next to represent the fourth H –Health and the green clover. Dark Blue represents life, growth, creativity, and youth.
- **For my club, my community, my country, and my world:** Slip a green bead on next to represent the whole earth. green is the color of the soil, the substance that gives each of us a strong footing to move forward.

4-H Friendship Bracelet

4-H Motto: To Make the Best Better: Slip a purple bead on next. Purple is the color of royalty and the color placed on champions. Make it your goal to always strive to be better.

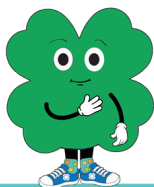
Goals and Ideals: Tie a second knot to hold the beads in place. By tying these knots, we are reminded to always keep your goals firm and our ideals in place.

Completion: Now we are ready to complete the bracelet. In 4-H, you can complete many projects as you learn the values this bracelet represents.

The sky's the limit: Slip both ends of the cord through the sky blue bead, going opposite directions, and tie a knot at both ends. The sky blue bead represents your potential as a 4-H member. Remember, the sky is the limit in 4-H!



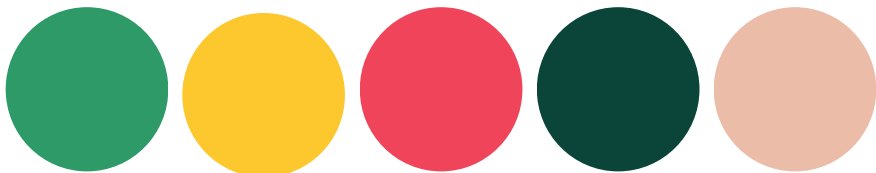

Rockets Away



Materials Needed:

- drinking straws (smaller)
- milkshake straws (larger)
- Fins pattern
- scissors
- pencil
- tape
- tape measurer



1. Tape one end of the larger straw closed. This will be the front, or nose, of your rocket.
2. Test how your first rocket flies. Insert the smaller straw into the open end of the rocket, leaving an inch out to hold onto. Stand at the launch line. Blow into the smaller straw to launch the rocket, making sure there are no people or objects to block its flight path.
3. Use your tape measure to measure how far it flew. Write down the distance.
4. Launch your rocket 2–3 times to see if it flies the same way, recording the distance for each launch.
5. Add a Fin and test how your rocket flies now. Tape the dark middle rectangle to the tail end of your rocket (the opposite end from the nose) and fold the fins so they stick out away from the rocket body in four different directions

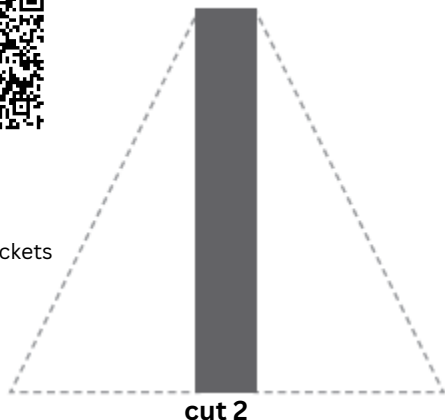


Stomp Rocket

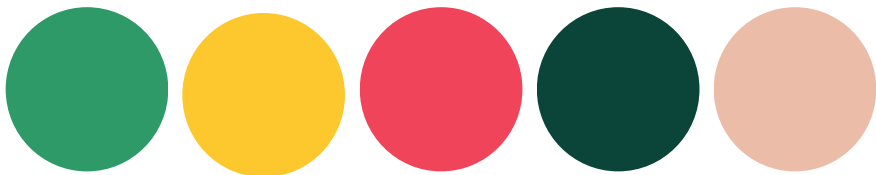

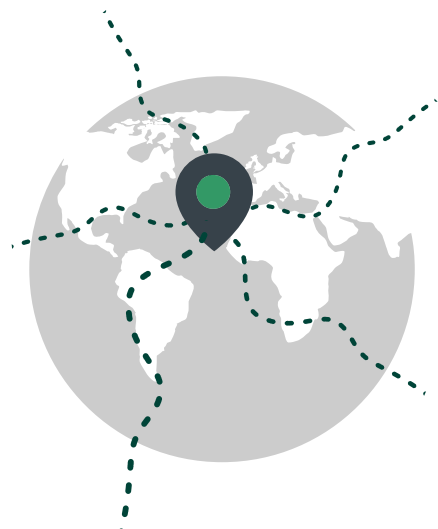


Olympic Facts

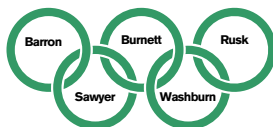
