The 4-H Emblem

The 4-H emblem is a four-leaf clover with an "H" on each leaf. It is protected by the U.S. government, meaning it has special rules for how it can be used. The numbers 18 USC 707 must always be shown with the emblem. For details on how to use the emblem correctly, contact the Extension Office.

What is 4-H?

Who is 4-H for? 4-H Members

4-H is for youth in grades 5K-13 (kindergarten through one year after high school)

- 3rd-13th grade pick your own projects
- K-2nd grade explore all the fun 4-H has to offer through the Cloverbud project

***Youth must be 5years old as of September 1
AND in 5 year kindergarten to join.

Here's what 4-H members can do:

- Join club or project meetings
- · Get involved in club/county activities
- · Participate in state events
- Work on projects all year long
- Set goals and complete a project record book
- Do a club demonstration
- Prepare exhibits for the fair
- Take on leadership roles

Families

4-H is all about family fun! Parents and supportive adults can get involved by helping with projects, staying updated on activities, and volunteering to lend a hand when needed.

Adult Volunteers/Leaders

Youth Enrollment Information

Youth can join 4-H at any time during the year, but re-enrollment starts after September 1 each year. Before signing up for any projects, youth need to:

- Choose a club to join that best fits your needs. It might be one in your neighborhood or a Single Project/Special Interest (SPIN) Club.
- A list of all available clubs in Barron County is on the Barron County website at barron.extension.wisc.edu/4h or in this guide.
- Make sure they meet the grade requirements to enroll in and participate in project activities.

Grade Level

Your grade is based on what grade you're in at the time of enrollment. If you are homeschooled, use your declared grade.* Youth can stay in 4-H until the year after high school graduation. The 4-H year runs from October 1 to September 30.

*Certain projects have certain age requirements (shooting sports). Youth must be 5 years old as of September 1st of the 4-H year to join. Review Wisconsin 4-H Membership policies at 4h.extension.wisc.edu if you have questions, or contact the Barron County Extension Office.

Enrollment Deadlines

- Youth must enroll in the projects they want to participate in.
- Some projects may have deadlines for fair participation to represent
 4-H at the Barron County Fair.
- Projects can be added or removed at any time by the member.
 Members can enter items related to their projects in the fair.

Membership Options

4-H Community Club Membership

4-H club members join a specific 4-H club, where youth and families meet throughout the year, usually once a month. Each club has a leader who keeps members informed, and many clubs elect youth officers to help lead activities. Barron County has 20 active 4-H clubs. Members can join more than one club or even start a new one! Club sizes range from 5 to 80 members. Along with club meetings, members can participate in organized projects and individual activities.

Why join a Traditional Community Club?

- Strong sense of community.
- Members can choose many projects and activities.
- · Regular meetings keep families up to date.
- Great leadership opportunities Clubs are led by dedicated volunteers and youth leaders.

What's Expected of a Club Member?

Each club has its own rules, so check with your club leader. In general, traditional community club members should:

- Attend meetings and participate in club activities.
- Work on projects and consider completing a record book or showcase.
- Follow club/county guidelines for membership and participation.
- Pay 4-H membership fees (assistance available).

Special Interest (SPIN) Membership/Single Project

Members can choose to join a multi-project special interest club or one of our two specialized (single project) clubs:

- Dog Project Club
- $\circ \ \, \text{Shooting Sports Club}$
- SPIN Club

Why join Special Interest/Single Project Clubs?

- Focus on a Specific Project Area great for people who can't commit to general monthly meetings.
- Targeted Communication-Get information when project is active.
- Flexible-Participation varies.

What's Expected of a SPIN Club Member?

Single project club rules/expectations may vary from the general Special Interest club. Please check with club leader. In general members are encouraged to:

- Participate in individual project related activities/meetings.
- Share/Showcase your learning through participation in competitions, demonstrations, and events.
- Complete a 4-H Project Record or Showcase.
- Pay SPIN membership fees (assistance available).



Membership: How to Join

Joining 4-H is simple, and you can be as involved as you want! Choose one project or many—it's flexible to fit your schedule.


Steps to Join:

Sign Up for Projects!

4-H projects are fun activities where members can explore their interests! Whether you love animals, science, art, or something else, there's a project for you. Volunteers help guide the learning, making it a great way to try new things and build skills! Barron County 4-H offers many projects that meet throughout the year. You can find details starting on page X.

Some projects have extra requirements or fees. For example, livestock project members must complete Youth Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) to show at the fair. Other groups may require a certain number of meetings. Be sure to check the details for your project!

Showcase Your 4-H Experience!

To complete the 4-H year, members are encouraged to create a Record or Showcase of their work. SPIN members must complete a Project Record Form.

You can choose how to showcase your work:

- A traditional or modern record book
- An digital showcase (slideshow, website, etc)
- · A simple record form

Turn in your Record/Showcase to your General Club Leader by the deadline they provide. Awards are given at the County Awards Program in October!

Picking a Project:

- Think about what interests you and choose a few areas you'd like to explore.
- Learn from different sources like adults, friends, family, online resources, or the library.
- Set goals for what you want to learn and do.

What's Next?

- Some projects have volunteer mentors to help guide you, but not all do.
- Check what resources are available in the county to support your project.
- Use the planning documents at the end of this guide to map out your project.

Keeping Track of Your Progress:

- All 4-H members are encouraged to complete a record book or showcase each year. (More details on the left side of this page.)
- Keep track of what you learn, set goals, and take lots of pictures.

Project vs. Exhibit: What's the Difference?

People often mix up the words "Project" and "Exhibit" in 4-H, but they are not the same! Project:

- A project is a topic you choose to learn about during the year.
- There are projects on almost anything animals, art, science, woodworking, and more!
- You pick your projects when you sign up for 4-H.

Exhibit:

- An exhibit is something you create as part of your project to show at the County Fair.
- A judge will review your exhibit and give you feedback.
- You don't choose your exhibit when you sign up for 4-H—you'll register for the fair in June.

4-H Project Support and Resources

There are three ways to get help with your 4-H project:

1. County-Wide Support

Some projects have volunteers or teams that offer learning opportunities for all 4-H members in Barron County. These are extra resources, not requirements. Some may have specific rules, which you can find online or by calling the Extension Office.

County-wide projects include:

- Dairy Project
- · Livestock Project (beef, sheep, swine)
- Dog Project
- Horse Project
- · Shooting Sports
- Junior Leaders (grades 6-8 and 9-13)

If your project isn't listed, there may still be volunteers who can help. Call the Extension Office for assistance!

2. Club-Level Support


Each 4-H club has project leaders who can help with specific topics. Check with your club leader to see what projects they support. Availability may change based on volunteer participation.

3. Independent Study

If there aren't volunteers for your project at the county or club level, you can still learn on your own! Use resources like:

- Extension Office Library Some project books are available to borrow. Contact the office for a list.

4-H Member (Grades 3-13) 4-H members choose which project(s) they want to enroll in each year. In 4-H, we believe in "learning by doing". That means project participation involves hands-on learning in the activities that spark your interest. In Barron County, you can sign up for any projects you might be interested in via 4-H online. You can add projects any time throughout the year.

CLOVERBUDS (Grades K-2) Big Fun for Little Learners!

Cloverbuds get to explore the exciting world of 4-H through hands-on activities, teamwork, and community involvement. They'll learn new skills, make friends, and discover different project areas to see what interests them most. Cloverbuds also get the chance to share what they've learned in creative and engaging ways. It's all about having fun, trying new things, and building a strong foundation for future 4-H experiences!

Terminology

- **4-H Activity –** Members can participate in 4-H activities regardless of the projects they are enrolled in. These activities can be individual or team-based, like softball.
- **4-H Association –** The 4-H Association is made up of leaders who raise funds, organize committees, advocate for 4-H, and provide input on opportunities. Voting members include 4-H volunteers and youth leaders.
- **4-H Club** A 4-H club is a group of members and volunteers who meet regularly to plan activities, community service, and leadership opportunities. Clubs should be led by youth, with adult volunteers supporting the activities.
- **4-H Council –** The 4-H Council is the elected group within the 4-H Association. They make decisions about policies, and provide leadership for financial and legal responsibilities, as well as overall guidance for the organization.
- **4-H Member** A 4-H member is any youth who participates in a 4-H club. Membership is open to all youth, regardless of their background, race, gender, religion, or beliefs. Youth can join 4-H from kindergarten through one year after high school graduation.
- **4-H Project –** A 4-H member can choose one or more project areas to focus on each year. These projects often involve meetings or workshops led by project leaders to help youth develop skills in their chosen area.
- **4-H Volunteer –** A 4-H volunteer is an adult (over 18) who has completed the Youth Protection Process and is currently enrolled in 4-H.
- **4-H Year –** The 4-H year runs from October 1 to September 30 of the following year.
- **4-H Youth Program Educator –** This is a staff member from the UW Madison Division of Extension who provides leadership and oversees all 4-H programs and groups in the county.

Junior Leaders – Junior Leaders are 4-H members in grades 6-8 and 9-13 who join a county leadership group. They focus on community development, volunteer work, and run a food stand at the County Fair.

Achievement – Each 4-H member must meet certain requirements during the year to achieve including:

- Giving a demonstration at a club meeting
- Exhibiting a project at a community event (does not have to be the county fair)
- Completing and turning in a 4-H Record Book or Showcase to their leader by the deadline
- Being actively involved in 4-H

Members who do not meet these requirements may lose eligibility for funding and other specific program benefits for the next 4-H year as outlined in specific group bylaws.

4-H Terminology, Continued

Charter Application – Every 4-H club, committee, or organization with a bank account must fill out an annual Charter form to use the 4-H Name and Emblem. Official clubs/groups must also fill them out.

Barron County 4-H E-Blast – A newsletter from Extension Barron County that provides 4-H families with updates and information about the 4-H program.

Cloverbud – Cloverbuds are members in kindergarten through second grade. They can't participate in some 4-H projects or events. This age group should enroll in the Cloverbud project when joining 4-H.

Club Officer – A club officer is any member elected to a leadership role in the club, such as President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, or Historian.

Club Rules & By-Laws – These are the written guidelines that each 4-H club follows to ensure they meet required achievement standards.

Enrollment – In September, every 4-H member and volunteer must fill out enrollment forms and choose their project areas for the year. Youth also need to sign a behavioral agreement.

General Club Leader – A general club leader is a volunteer who helps run the club. They recruit members, manage enrollment, and support officers in their duties.

UW-Madison Division of Extension – This organization provides educational programs in collaboration with various fields to meet community challenges, protect natural resources, and support youth through these programs:

4-H Events and Opportunities

Here's a list of exciting activities and events happening locally, across Wisconsin, and beyond! Be sure to keep an eye on newsletters and emails for the latest updates and details.

Local Events & Opportunities

4-H Clubs

4-H members and families choose the club they want to join. While clubs are in specific areas, you don't have to pick the closest one! Each club offers different activities and opportunities. Ask leaders or families for more details about what each club offers.

4-H Camp

Throughout the 4-H year, there are several camp programs available, such as Day Camps for Cloverbuds, Summer Camp for grades 3-8, and Camp Counselor opportunities for grades 9-13.

4-H Projects

Youth can get involved in a variety of project activities throughout the year. Volunteers organize classes and learning events, and members can also plan and lead their own projects. Some countywide projects include livestock, dairy, dogs, leathercraft, horses, and shooting sports.

Awards Program

In October, youth who have excelled in their project areas are chosen to receive awards for their hard work. In addition to project awards, special club awards are also presented during this event.

4-H Graduation

At the end of each year, a graduation event celebrates the accomplishments of graduating members. Select members may also receive scholarships and county awards for their achievements. Scholarship applications are due by June 1, and graduation takes place on the Saturday of fair week (unless stated otherwise).

National 4-H Week

The first full week in October is dedicated to promoting 4-H! Counties across the country use that year's theme to create displays and special events to encourage new members for the upcoming year.

Performance Arts Festival Day/Talent Expo

4-H members from across the county showcase their talents in drama, speech, music, and demonstrations. Participants are judged, and a few are selected for awards and the chance to perform at the Barron County Fair. This is open to youth of all ages. Registration opens in January/February.

Project Discovery Days

Throughout the year, Project Discovery Days give members the chance to explore different 4-H projects. Activities range from crafting to small engines to woodworking. Stay tuned for updates in newsletters!

Virtual Learning

Local virtual learning opportunities are available, including events for National 4-H Week in October. Starting in January, virtual sessions are available for five different project areas. For more details, check the Wisconsin 4-H website.

4-H Softball

During the summer, 4-H clubs form softball teams to compete against each other in a league and championship tournament. It's a great way to get active and have fun! (3rd grade and older)

Local Events Continued

Clothing/Foods/Cake Decorating Revue

Members in the Clothing, Foods, or Cake Decorating projects have their work judged before the Barron County Fair. Exhibitors are asked questions about their projects, and after judging, the projects are displayed for the public to see at the fair. (all ages)

Junior Leaders

4-H Junior Leaders are older youth who work together to give back to their communities and clubs. They run the Junior Leader Food Stand during fair week, where they gain leadership experience and have the chance to earn money. By volunteering at the food stand and completing other duties, Junior Leaders get access to exciting opportunities and activities. (grades 6-8 and 9-13)

Barron County Fair

The Barron County Fair takes place every July at the fairgrounds in Rice Lake. While it's hosted by the Barron County Fair board and open to all, 4-H members make up most of the exhibitors. At the fair, 4-H members display and have their projects judged, which is an important part of their Achievement. It's also a fun time to spend with friends and other club members while enjoying various 4-H and fair events. For Junior Leaders, the food stand is a great opportunity to meet new people and volunteer. Be sure to register for the fair by June. Adult Volunteer, Leader, and Parent Involvement

General Information

We're always looking for volunteer project leaders! If there's a project you're interested in or if you think there's a need for a new project in your club or county, we'd love to hear from you. No special experience or education is needed—just a willingness to work with youth.

How to Become a Volunteer:

- 1. Contact the Extension Office to learn about available opportunities.
- 2. Fill out the Volunteer Form and decide which role is right for you.
- 3. Enroll in 4-H as a volunteer.
- 4. Complete the required background check, mandated reporter training, VIP training, and any other necessary trainings.

Club Leaders & Co-Leaders

Club leaders are essential to providing youth with positive development experiences. They work with both youth and adults to lead the club, serving as the main contact between the club and the county.

Activity Leaders & Event Volunteers

If you enjoy organizing or leading events, this is the role for you! Activity leaders help organize events on the club or county level. You can also volunteer as a committee member to help with planning and execution.

County Resource Leaders

County Resource Leaders support county-wide projects and leadership opportunities. While they aren't required to be in a specific club, they can choose to be. Examples include leading county projects, serving on committees, and creating leadership opportunities.

Project Leaders

Project Leaders are responsible for leading and organizing specific project groups. These groups focus on a particular topic and can be organized at the club or county level.

Chaperones

Chaperones provide adult supervision at events and activities, including overnight trips, to ensure youth safety and well-being.

Committees

As a volunteer or parent, you can join one of these committees:

- Educational Programming: Clothing Revue, Foods Revue, County-wide Trips, Performance Arts Festival, Project Discovery Days
- Awards & Recognition: Awards, Awards Banquet, County Recognition
- Financial Support: Plat Book, Food Stand, Raffle, Scholarships
- Promotion: Recruitment, Marketing

Committees report to the Barron County 4-H
Adult Leaders Association and the 4-H
Educator. They're responsible for planning and
carrying out activities related to their area,
including budgeting, setting rules, and
regulations. Committees also choose their own
chairperson, who reports on committee
advisory decisions at Association meetings.

Parents and Guardians – How Your Child Can Be Successful in Barron County 4-H

The Barron County 4-H program values the involvement of parents and guardians, as each brings unique talents and experiences that can support local 4-H clubs. However, it is important to let youth take the lead in their 4-H experience.

4-H club meetings and activities are welcoming spaces for parents and guardians to join in. While not all parents may have the time to participate equally, here are some helpful ways you can support your child's success in Barron County 4-H:

- 1. Encourage Fun and Exploration Help your child embrace 4-H as a chance to try new things and have fun!
- 2. **Praise and Support** Celebrate your child's achievements, and provide encouragement when challenges arise.
- 3. **Offer Constructive Feedback** Share ideas and suggestions that support your child's growth and help improve their 4-H experience.
- 4. **Instill Strong Character** Teach your child that character matters. Encourage values like fairness, honesty, respect, and trustworthiness.
- 5. **Get Involved in Fundraisers and Service Projects** Offer your help with fundraising, community service activities, or educational programs.
- 6. **Provide Resources** Help supply refreshments, materials, or other items for your child's 4-H club activities.
- 7. Learn Together Help your child learn the 4-H Pledge and 4-H songs introduced at meetings.
- 8. **Support Project Selection** Help your child choose projects that match their interests and ensure they complete them according to Barron County's deadlines.
- 9. **Stay Informed** Keep up with club and county requirements by reading communications from the 4-H club leader or Barron County Extension office.
- 10. **Encourage Independence** Offer guidance, but let your child take ownership of their work and projects.
- 11. **Support Regular Attendance** If your family joins a 4-H Club, encourage your child to attend 4-H club meetings regularly to stay connected and engaged.
